Good afternoon. Today my topic is: Get more sleep to succeed. After becoming a college student, we are occupied by many things, so every night we stay up late. Most of college students will put their heads down and take short naps in between classes. It seems that they are always lacking sleep. Well, today I would like to point out the importance of getting more sleep if you hope to succeed!

Let me begin with our life cycle, yes, the lifecycle of a university student. Usually, we stay up late, and of course, we will get up feeling tired. So throughout the day, we yawn and doze off in class. We promise ourselves that we will not stay up again and will go to bed earlier. As the Old Chinese proverb goes: your day's plan depends on the morning. Here is an interesting comparison. Let's presume 11 pm is the perfect time to go to bed, and you have class at 9 am.

First lifestyle: You choose to stay up late and study until 2 am. You may have done 3 hours of studying, but because it is getting very late, you are all tired and the studying does not go so well. You wake up at 8 am to get ready to go to class, with only 6 hours of sleep. Naturally you doze off in class.

Second lifestyle: You choose to go to bed at 11 pm. You sleep well for 7 whole hours and wake up at 6 am. Between 6 am and 8 am, you still have 2 hours of clear-headedness to study because you have enough sleep. And what you have studied in the morning will stay fresh in your mind for your classes during the day.

Maybe you think losing one hour of sleep per night won't affect daytime functioning, and you prefer to gain one more hour to study. But losing that hour of sleep can affect your ability to work, learn, create, and communicate. 6 hours of sleeping is simply not enough. Most healthy adults need between 7 to 9 hours of sleep to function at their best. On the other hand, getting enough sleep and waking up early will give you a clear mind, better concentration, and efficiency in learning. Above all, you can stay healthy! All these advantages will lead you to a successful life!

So, my advice for all of you: Go to bed earlier, sleep more to succeed!

Today I'd like to share with you my thoughts on the movie "Avatar." I chose this film because it is closely related to some of our readings this semester, and it also makes us think more deeply about environmental issues.

"Avatar" is not just a fictional animated film, but a film that warns us about the damage that humans bring to nature. The main characters in the film went to the Pandora planet because they have been hired to explore the forest resources for profit. In this process, the company uses all kinds of machinery to destroy the trees, the animals, and even the indigenous people, and the movie clearly shows the dark side of human nature when it is filled with greed. In the second half of the film, the scientists stood up against the military and worked with the Navi people to protect the planet. And finally the animals, the trees, and the Navi people, with the help of the scientists, defeated the military and the company. In the end of the film, a Navi and a scientist died. The Navi got together and pray to their goddess Eywa, hoping to bring another scientist back to life. I was very impressed by this scene because nature is sacred to the Navi in a way that modern people cannot really understand.

I think there are two important lessons in the film. First of all, even though the scientists seem to be good guys helping the Navi, we should not forget that they are also hired by the company in the first place. In other words, even the good guys may not that good. Secondly, Pandora is the home to the peaceful Navi people who live in harmony with nature, but humans proudly think that they can give a better life to the indigenous people. In fact, when humans come, the Navi way of life is almost destroyed.

It is very interesting that in the film, the hero is a handicapped person. He is considered useless in the human world, but with the help of technology, he could become very powerful as a Navi. The film shows how he learned to love the Navi way of life and gradually identified with them. When he learned that his companions are going to destroy the Navi, he turned against earth people and fought alongside the Navi. In the end, he almost gave his life for the Navi. He and the scientist who died in the battle redeemed all the bad things that the other humans did.

Through Avatar, we clearly see the selfishness of humans, and the preciousness of nature. The film reminds us to appreciate and protect nature because, as the Navi say: "all energy is only borrowed and one day you have to give it back."

In our readings this semester, I am most concerned about "the story of cosmetics" and all the toxic chemicals that may be found in our daily use of shampoo, lipstick, or nail polish.

My sister bought a bottle of shampoo for me for my birthday the other day, it is claimed to be all "natural and simple." Its color is red and it says its ingredients contain different kinds of red berries. However, I don't trust this "specially-made" shampoo because I smelt it and instantly felt the smell is too strong. My mother has told me that natural stuff should only have light fragrances so I have always distrusted strong fragrances. Actually, I am afraid of them. Our dorm had a cleaning lady who cleans the restroom and bathroom for us. I sometimes chat with her. O morning when I was brushing my teeth, she told me that there were many strands of hair on the ground in the bathroom and the loss of hair may have been caused by our shampoos containing too many unknown chemicals. My mother also had told me that when I use shampoo, I should try to use as little as possible and try not to wash my hair every day.

All these experiences warned me about the chemicals in shampoos, but the nail polisher is another big problem. These days, many girls like to put nail polish on their nails to improve their looks. But there are already too many acknowledged toxic chemicals in these nail polishes. I don't like nail polishes either because the strange smell often makes me think of plastics. And the bright color also alarms me. It must be a sign of strong toxins.

I am saddened when I think of all the chemicals that pollute our life nowadays. Science has brought prosperity to us, but there is a price to pay: our health is getting worse every day as we lather chemical products onto our bodies. We are actually dying slowly and unconsciously, the victim of a heavily chemical world. But isn't this also our own fault, as we are the ones who choose to use such products? In fact, there are other less harmful shampoos that we could have chosen. But somehow we chose to use the fragrant and colorful but toxic ones.

Last week, one of my teammates reported on the production of the chickens that we eat almost every day. I was interested in the report because I never thought about this topic before. Then I read in our reading that different parts of the chicken are favored by different cultures. That reminds me that we Chinese seem to enjoy the inside of not only chickens, but also of other kinds of animal. Even though now we are aware that it is rich in saturated fat, cholesterol and calories, and is bad for our health if we eat too much of it, it is still very popular in Chinese cuisine.

The organs inside animals are called "the offal," which means the non-muscular part of slaughtered animals, such as the internal organization and internal organs. Eating offal has been a cheap source of protein in many cultures and is quite tasteful. Take for example the blood. In our culture, blood is used to make blood sausages and blood cakes. It is a main source of iron but also has more fat and cholesterol. The intestines (清陽) are also popular because people believe it would help you lose weight. But of course it has to be thoroughly cleaned and cooked before eating, or else you might run into something that is not so tasty. The liver is rich in protein, iron and Vitamin A, but tastes fishy and is high in cholesterol. The tongue is a good source of iron and protein, but has high saturated fat content, so it is preferable to cook it with water and for a long time. Nowadays, there is another offal delicacy that is becoming very famous—it is the spicy goose heart. It became famous after a news program reported that a famous killer likes to eat spicy goose heart because the heart is also a good source of protein. It won't make you a killer but it will make you unhealthy if you eat too much of such food.

Although eating internal organs is common in the Chinese society, it seems that western cultures think we are barbarian for doing so. But let's not forget the French also consider goose liver to be the most precious dish in French cuisine. They call it Foie gras and it is very expensive. In fact, Westerners eat as many kinds of offal as we do. For example, horse heart, sheep face, calf brain, duck heart, pig mouth, cow belly, pig lung, duck tongue, pig ears, cow heart, cow kidney, marrow, cow liver, cow tongue, pancreas, chicken lung, cow face, etc. So in that sense, there is no reason for Westerners to look down upon us. Food is just food and we need to make use of food in order to survive. At least we are not wasting.

The class has almost come to an end, and I think I have learned a lot and got many inspirations through this class. Looking back at the lessons we had in this class, the most impressive issue for me is "The story behind the Selfie."

This report has challenged the old saying that "pictures always tell the truth." In the report, three leaders from different countries took a selfie together in the memorial service for South African former president Nelson Mandela. The picture sparked controversy, and all the media reported it negatively. Actually when I first saw the picture, I was shocked and furious too. I thought it was ridiculous for people to do such a casual thing as taking a selfie at the funeral, especially when they are world leaders, significant role models that represent their countries! However, in fact the journalist just wanted to show that even the leaders of countries can act like normal people. Moreover, based on the culture in South Africa, the funeral should be happy and celebrated by everyone at that moment. So it is normal for people to sing and laugh at that time. After seeing the explanation of the journalist who took this picture, I felt very embarrassed because there was no difference between me and the irresponsible media: we all tended to use our own opinion to judge others first, rather than truly understand the whole story.

The misunderstanding of pictures makes me think of one of the classic scenes in popular TV drama. A girl sees her boyfriend hugging another girl and becomes furious and wants to break up with her boyfriend. In the end, she'll find out that the girl her boyfriend was hugging is actually his sister. It is one way to tell the audience not to believe what they see through their eyes. Though the principle is easy to understand, it is really hard to achieve, for our emotions often rush to our heads too quickly.

This picture also reminds me of one other serious problem--what about the pictures of the past? This time, the selfie can be explained because the photographer is still alive and can explain what really happened. However, the historical pictures, whether photographed or even drawn in the past, have already lost their creators. How can I be sure if the pictures are what they seem? Who can tell the story of what really lies behind the pictures? Perhaps we will never know the truth! It is a horrible feeling that the text book and the history I have believed in my whole life may be actually false!

This is what I have thought many times after taking this course, and I am learning to always question everything and never take for granted the knowledge I have learned since I was a child. I may not have all the answers, but I will try to consider more things before I make a judgment.

Today I want to talk about Hallyu. In recent years, Korean songs, Korean singers, Korean TV drama, and even Korean cuisine are sweeping across Taiwan. Why does this phenomenon occur? How can Hallyu fascinate so many people?

K-pop is really popular among teenagers, and it has some characteristics which are different from Taiwan's popular music. Korean entertainment industry created many idol groups, and these groups not only have good appearances but also well-crafted performances. Furthermore, before the debut of the groups, members have to go through a series of rigorous training so their artistic level is really high. And there is a toxic quality to their music and dance steps too, which are widely imitated by teenagers.

Besides, Korean entertainment companies use other strategies to attract fans. They often create certain group images for their performers, and the performers have to stick to these images whenever they appear in public. Some shows are really quite creative. For example, this is a show in which two famous performers must somehow fall in love during the program. This is a new topic for us, so we will be attracted by these new things.

Although Korean entertainment industry is really successful, the stars are under enormous pressure. There is a site that introduces the bitter process of becoming a performing artist. (in PPT) If you want to be successful, you have to give up your family, your friend, your lover, your freedom, your health, even your life. In fact, in the past years, quite a number of Korean stars committed suicide. Although hallyu is really successful, how many people know about the hardships behind the lives of these glamorous stars?

After nearly a semester's oral training, from the individual sharing famous quotes to group representations of different worthy discussion topics, every one of us has experienced tons of speaking opportunity in front of the whole class. Most of us might rarely have the opportunity to speak in English in our daily life so often. Even in school, there is seldom chance for us to communicate in English in class, not to mention having a speech or presentation in English in front of the crowds. Therefore, not until we finally start to talk in full English did we realize how poor our English might be. Perhaps our English proficiency isn't as good as we thought.

Even giving a speech in our mother tongue language isn't that easy, not to mention speaking in a foreign language. It may be a good idea to recall the faces that impressed you in class or in daily life: politicians, businessman, celebrities, such as Obama, Steve Jobs, Oprah, etc. We rely on language to communicate with each other, so learning the skills of being articulate is a great advantage.

Nobody is born to be good at something. What determines who is more outstanding is who will put in more effort. In the end, perseverance is the key.

I learned a lesson in the first oral training class of this semester. That is, you need to read the syllables carefully and be well prepared, especially in the first class.

In our first class, those who didn't bring a quote were assigned one. I got a quote which was spoken by a famous inventor, Thomas A. Edison. The quote "I have not failed. Jo inspired us to think and to decipher sayings in more creative and more unique manners.

No matter in the East or in the West, there is the same saying that "Seeing is believing." This slang tells us that if there is an image for something, then we can believe it because the evidence is there. But the article on "that selfie" gave us a lesson to reconsider what we should believe. The story behind that selfie was written by the journalist who had taken the selfie of three well-known politicians during South Africa's farewell and funeral ceremony for Nelson Mandela. this image seemed to win more attention than the event itself. The photojournalist stated that he accidentally took this picture in a relaxed carnival atmosphere in which South Africans were singing and laughing to honor their departed leader. Simultaneously, he captured a stern look of Michelle Obama, but in fact it was just this very moment after she had joked with those around her. So this article totally subverted our recognition of the three leaders' indecent behavior during a solemn occasion, or our initial belief that Obama was being disrespectful to his beloved wife while taking a selfie with a beauty besides her. This article proved that seeing does not equal believing, particularly when we do not possess a full understanding of the issue. Consequently, we should both look carefully and understand it fully before delivering our comment, and do not blindly follow the opinion of the public.
